



They demonstrate their obedience in chores. They express their reverence and docility while at Mass. It's a day filled with camaraderie and joy and good food under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. And we bring our day to a close in front of the Blessed Sacrament in Eucharistic Adoration.



Deacon Randy Park has been a core volunteer dating back to 2012 beginning at Leadership Camp in the Diocese of Lincoln. After three years there, he helped Toby establish Camp Virtus et Veritas in the Archdiocese of Omaha in 2015. WHAT IS A RITE OF PASSAGE?

Ministry Update from the Executive Director

In our last newsletter, I shared the exciting news of the newest V2 initiative to form young men, called Esto Vir, which is currently in the pilot stage. This name is Latin for "Be a man" and is taken from the writings of St. Josemaría Escriva. Most of all, it perfectly captures our goal for the project: to build a 'rite of passage' which forms boys into virtuous Catholic men. But many of you may not be familiar with the concept of a rite of passage or have only a vague understanding of this ancient practice.

A rite of passage is a set of experiences from childhood to adulthood that teaches boys what it means to be a man in their particular society. **Historically, nearly all cultures** across time and place utilized rites of passage to cultivate the desired virtues in their next generation of men. They had a clear understanding that puberty is a critically important stage in a young man's life, that the formation he receives during this stage, or lack thereof, can make or break his future. This means, by extension, that the formation of a society's young men can make or break the future of that society.

Recognizing the importance of forming boys into men, they would guide their young men through a years-long maturation process from adolescence to adulthood, which included:

- · Moral and spiritual formation
- Experiences that forge male identity (accepting responsibility, overcoming fear and adversity, taking risks, self-sacrifice, building confidence, managing conflict)
- · Preparation for leadership roles in the community
- Band of brothers: a sense of belonging and deep bonds of brotherhood among boys
- Intergenerational mentorship: an invitation from the father into a greater community of men including elders of the community.

Fast forward to the current day, where our culture has completely lost the concept of a rite of passage. Where previous societies gave boys a path to manhood, our society gives them a question mark. Today's boys no longer know what it means to be a man or how to get there.

At V2, our vision is to reclaim the rite of passage. Taking the best from traditional rites of passage and infusing them with the wisdom of the Catholic Church, **we will provide boys a path to manhood rooted in virtue and authentic Catholic masculinity.** We invite you to unite with us in prayer for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our next great adventure.
